

### Thinking Outside the Box

Conceptualizing Ongoing Pharmacy Practice Expansion

Pharmacists have become incredibly versatile during the scope of practice expansions that have been implemented within the last decade. For many key stakeholders involved in the evolution of pharmacy practice, a primary focus has been to ensure that all provinces and territories allow pharmacists to provide a similar level of care, along with the novel addition of pharmacists to key practice areas, such as primary care.

While these practice expansions are critical and certainly of importance for the future of pharmacy, it may be valuable to consider what else we are aiming for, particularly as the future of a universal scope of practice across Canada becomes closer to reality. from a profession that Coming historically only acted within the walls of a pharmacy to assist in the dispensation of medications, it can be challenging consider what pharmacists might be able to add in different settings. The remodelling of practice—which pharmacy has pulled pharmacists in a clinical direction—allows for a breadth of additional opportunities that have vet to be fully developed implemented.



#### Incorporating Equity and Sustainability in Clinical Services

#### **Providing Home Visits**

As pharmacists continue to expand their ability to provide clinical services and pointof-care testing, it is important that patients can utilize these services regardless of their ability to visit the pharmacy. Individuals may have mobility or transportation restrictions that limit regular and ongoing INR monitoring for warfarin. physical assessments for minor ailments, effective reviews, and medication more. patients may additionally be unable to utilize virtual technology for services we may typically consider eligible for virtual care. For this patient population, pharmacists becoming adaptable in their ability to visit their homes to provide these services could significantly impact patients' care and wellness.

#### **Environmental Considerations**

There are significant environmental impacts from pharmacy practice; however, there are methods to improve sustainability within our profession. The addition of therapeutic substitutions and adaptations to many provinces and territories across Canada provides an opportunity for pharmacists to converse with patients about opportunities to select more environmentally friendly therapeutic options.

An example of this could be educating patients on the environmental impact of their metered-dose inhalers, and the environmental benefits of substituting this for a dry powder inhaler. This example is only one of many; more information regarding pharmacy practice and the environment is outlined by the Canadian Association of Pharmacy for the Environment (CAPhE), CASCADES, and the Health Products Stewardship Association.



Pharmacists are medication experts, and as such, it's important that they have a presence as local educators. The concept of pharmacists as educators is already implemented within pharmacies through one-on-one counselling, but on a larger scale, pharmacists can host seminars for the public to attend, or even organize specific sessions for select populations. example, pharmacists might be able to host a session regarding cardiovascular health and medication use for the public to attend, or host a session on medication-related fall risk at a facility for seniors. Increasing awareness of the safe use of medications is critical, particularly during an age misinformation, and pharmacists are best equipped for these discussions.

#### **Youth Engagement**

Engagement with young adults is important for all professions, and pharmacy is no exception. Many young individuals do not have pharmacists regularly involved in their care unless they regularly take prescription medication. which is the minority adolescents. Therefore, many of these individuals do not regularly observe what pharmacists do and may not immediately think of them when considering future career choices. Therefore, pharmacists need to ensure they provide information to youth where possible, including through career fairs, advertising of volunteer and job opportunities for students, and offering job shadowing.

#### <u>Supporting Underserved Populations—</u> <u>Shelters and Homelessness</u>

Pharmacists are also uniquely positioned to collaborate with organizations that help underserved communities. For example, we might consider a close connection of pharmacy with shelters for individuals facing homelessness, and how this could impact the lives of these people. In this setting, pharmacists could aid by assisting with locating and completing Pharmacare paperwork to enable medication accessibility adherence for clients facing homelessness. There mav also be considerations to provide naloxone kits with appropriate training to staff members to combat any potential for untreated opioid toxicities. Additionally, providing a direct line to the pharmacy—such as other healthcare providers may use—for inquiries regarding where to seek care for certain medical concerns. drug interactions, and minor ailments/over-the-counter options.

These are only a few examples of ways that pharmacists can continue to expand on what we do for our patients, for other healthcare providers and frontline workers, for our communities, and for the environment. Not only are we able to help others by implementing these services and supports, but we can continue to shine the spotlight on what pharmacists are uniquely able to do as healthcare providers. Positive press for pharmacy is a good model for recognition of our services, but more importantly, it further ensures pharmacists are viewed as valuable healthcare providers by influential stakeholders, such as elected officials. These individuals will, in turn, invest in the future of our profession with this greater understanding of what we can achieve. To solidify the growth of the profession, we must continue to act progressively and seek out unique opportunities as avenues for the future of pharmacy.



## DID YOU KNOW...

# Student loan forgiveness has been extended to <u>pharmacists</u> and other healthcare providers!

This marks a significant victory for advocacy, made possible by our strong collaboration with CAPSI and the impactful #PharmLoanForgive initiative, which generated hundreds of letters to elected representatives!

This success was not achieved overnight. It was the result of several strategic and concerted efforts:

- Direct advocacy: Over the past several years, we have engaged in direct advocacy with Members of Parliament and department officials, ensuring that the voices and concerns of pharmacists are heard at the highest levels of government.
- Letter-writing campaign: In collaboration with CAPSI, we initiated a
  targeted <u>letter-writing campaign</u> that generated hundreds of letters
  from pharmacists and pharmacy students across the country. This
  campaign both demonstrated our collective resolve and highlighted
  widespread support within the professional community.
- 3. Collaborative efforts: Our success was further bolstered by working collaboratively with other health professional groups, presenting a united front in our advocacy for the inclusion of more health-care professions in the loan forgiveness program.
- 4. Pre-budget submissions: We consistently included this ask in our pre-budget submissions, emphasizing the importance of student loan forgiveness for pharmacists as a critical factor in equitable access to health care across Canada.
